In Palestine, winter is upon us and, as you know from the headlines, it is a particularly difficult time here. But as I heard someone on TV say recently, "I am a Palestinian so I am hopeful."

In designing our libraries and programs, Seraj aims to respond to local conditions, including the weather. In February and March, temperatures range from about 40 to 54 degrees Fahrenheit, which is "very cold" to "cold" here.

Programs for All Ages

Youth

Children everywhere want to "hang out" after school closes. But in many towns and villages, Palestinian youth have no place to gather. At the <u>Aida refugee camp</u> between Bethlehem and Jerusalem, they face a particular challenge because the barrier wall now separates them from the surrounding recreational area.

But at the Seraj library in Aida, children play games, participate in English classes, and read books at comfy tables.

This library is particularly crowded on Fridays, when regular incursions by the Israeli military make it unsafe to play in the streets.

For many centuries in Palestine, it was traditional for families of all faiths to celebrate holidays together. This past December, Seraj's cultural center in Birzeit hosted a Christmas party in

partnership with the Edward Said National Conservatory of Music.

Students and teachers from the Conservatory played <u>the traditional lute-like buzuq</u> and Seraj staff member George Ghattas led the children's choir, complete with Santa hats.

About 100 folks joined in this event, grateful for a few hours of joy during a stressful time in the region.

Seniors

In Palestine, there is a strong cultural tradition that seniors stay home in the winter. For this reason, Seraj's outreach to this group is currently on hold. But these programs flourish in other seasons because no other organizations in the community serve them. Come spring, the library in Birzeit will draw hundreds from nearby villages for traditional storytelling, songs, and games.



Meet George Ghattas

George works with Seraj because he is passionate about sharing all aspects of the Palestinian culture. Born in Bethlehem, he was a natural to lead the choir at Seraj's Christmas party. He worked for over 20 years at the National Conservatory and, in addition to the buzuq, plays the cello, guitar, piano, and drums.

George was "instrumental" to the success of the October 2022 Seraj Trip in Palestine: He made sure all participants were well fed with the local specialties, broke into song to demonstrate the acoustics at a Greek Orthodox church and, along with the rest of the Seraj staff, was the perfect host.
